10 May Templates: 2 Sizes

1. Flower
2. Maracas
3. Sombrero
4. Cricket
5. Heart with "Mom"
6. Bird nest
7. Seedling
8. Sun
9. Picnic basket
10. American flag



Suggestions

4. Textured Rubbing Collage

• Directions:

- Place textured objects (screen, leaf, sandpaper) under the template paper.
- Rub crayons over it to create a texture.
- Cut out the template (or have adults pre-cut).
- Mount on colored paper for a tactile art piece.

💡 **Skill:** Builds awareness of pressure and grip.

5. Crinkle and Glue Tissue Paper

• Directions:

- Tear small squares of tissue paper.
- Students crumple each piece into a tiny ball.
- Dab glue inside template sections and press tissue balls down.

💡 **Tip:** This adds texture and repetition—great for students who like sensory feedback.

6. Yarn or String Tracing

• Directions:

- Squeeze a line of glue along the outline of the image.
- Students place yarn or string pieces on the glue lines.
- Let dry, then feel the raised outline.

💡 **Skill:** Encourages visual-motor precision and finger isolation.

7. Pom-Pom Dabbing

• Directions:

- Clip a pom-pom into a clothespin to make a “dabber.”
- Dip into paint and stamp inside a May template.
- Use color patterns or fill the entire shape.

💡 **Variation:** Use feathers or cotton balls for a different look.

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8. Paper Punch Collage

• Directions:

- Use paper punches.
- Students glue punched pieces inside a May template.
- Practice one-hand paper placement and finger isolation.

💡 **Skill:** Builds coordination and grip strength.

9. Feather or Fabric Decorating

• Directions:

- Cut or pre-cut soft fabric or feathers.
- Glue them on the template.
- Discuss textures (“soft,” “tickly,” “smooth”).

💡 **Tip:** Great sensory engagement for students who like touch-based learning.

10. Sand or Salt Painting

• Directions:

- Draw glue lines inside the template.
- Sprinkle colored sand or dyed salt over the glue.
- This is great for the Earth template; salt indicates salt water.
- Shake off excess onto a tray.

💡 **Skill:** Builds control when squeezing glue and improves hand stability.

11. Tear and Layer Silhouette Art

• Directions:

- Students tear black (or blue if creating sky) construction paper to fill the *background* around the template to create a silhouette image.
- This is great for the sun outline.
- Glue layers behind a cut-out template to create a silhouette

💡 **Tip:** Adds depth while keeping fine-motor demands manageable.

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Easy to find supplies



- White paper or cardstock
- Glue sticks and liquid glue
- Scissors
- Washable paint
- Paint trays or paper plates
- Pom-poms, or sponges for dabbing
- Tissue paper
- Construction paper
- Yarn or string
- Buttons, beads, or sequins
- Small stickers or color-coding dots
- Paper punches
- Feathers or fabric scraps
- Crayons and colored pencils
- Dot markers
