10 June Templates: 2 Sizes

1. Ice cream cone
2. Popsicle
3. Flip flops
4. Watermelon slice
5. Sandcastle
6. Firefly
7. Father's Day tie
8. Sunflower
9. Strawberry
10. Graduation cap



Suggestions

4. Textured Rubbing Collage

- **Directions:**
 - Place textured objects (screen, leaf, sandpaper) under the template paper.
 - Rub crayons over it to create a texture.
 - Cut out the template (or have adults pre-cut).
 - Mount on colored paper for a tactile art piece.
- 💡 **Skill:** Builds awareness of pressure and grip.

5. Crinkle and Glue Tissue Paper

- **Directions:**
 - Tear small squares of tissue paper.
 - Students crumple each piece into a tiny ball.
 - Dab glue inside template sections and press tissue balls down.
- 💡 **Tip:** This adds texture and repetition—great for students who like sensory feedback.

6. Yarn or String Tracing

- **Directions:**
 - Squeeze a line of glue along the outline of the image
 - Students place yarn or string pieces on the glue lines.
 - Let dry, then feel the raised outline.
- 💡 **Skill:** Encourages visual-motor precision and finger isolation.

7. Pom-Pom Dabbing

- **Directions:**
 - Clip a pom-pom into a clothespin to make a “dabber.”
 - Dip into paint and stamp inside a June template.
 - Use color patterns or fill the entire shape.
- 💡 **Variation:** Use feathers or cotton balls for a different look.

12. Button or Bead Outline

- **Directions:**
 - Squeeze a glue line around the shape.
 - Students place buttons, flat beads, or sequins along the edge.
 - Fill with paint or leave the center open for contrast.
- 💡 **Skill:** Improves finger placement and pinch strength.

13. Leaf or Nature Prints

- **Directions:**
 - Collect leaves or textured materials.
 - Dip them in the paint and press them onto the template.
 - Overlap colors to create a textured effect.
- 💡 **Tip:** Combine with a nature walk for movement and sensory input.

14. Marble Painting

- **Directions:**
 - Tape template in the bottom of a box (I like using pizza boxes)
 - Squeeze a dollop of paint onto the template.
 - Students drop marbles and then tilt the box so it rolls through the paint.
 - Continue with more dollops of paint and clean marbles.
- 💡 **Skill:** Great for students with significant fine motor issues.

15. Foil Art

- **Directions:**
 - Place a bead of glue along the outline of the template.
 - Take a piece of foil and lay it over the top, smoothing it over the glue outline.
 - Let dry.
 - Tear off foil around the outer edges.
- 💡 **Tip:** Improves pinch strength and fine motor control to tear slowly.

Easy to find supplies



- White paper or cardstock
- Glue sticks and liquid glue
- Scissors
- Washable paint
- Paint trays or paper plates
- Pom-poms, or sponges for dabbing
- Tissue paper
- Construction paper
- Yarn or string
- Buttons, beads, or sequins
- Small stickers or color-coding dots
- Paper punches
- Feathers or fabric scraps
- Crayons and colored pencils
- Dot markers
