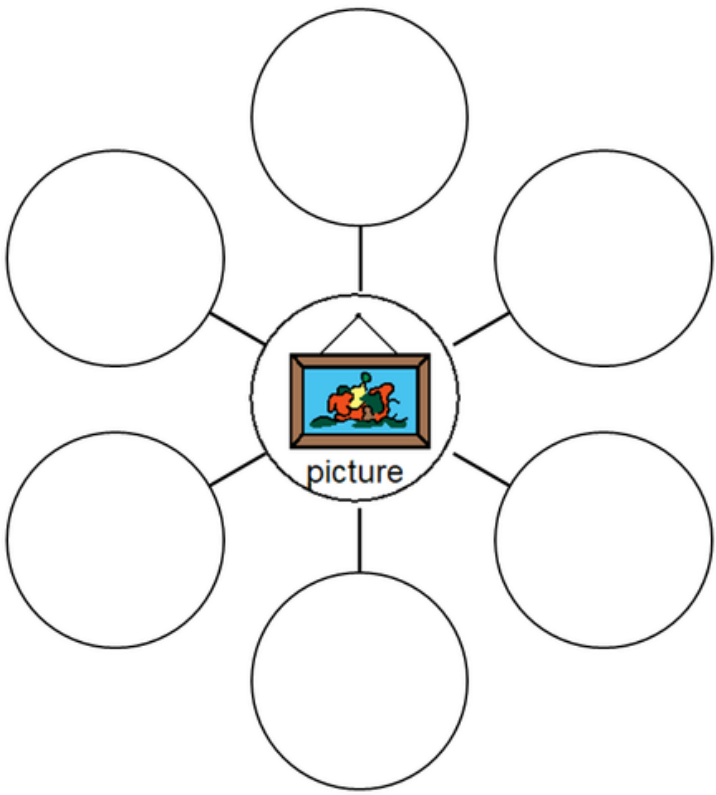

What can a picture tell you?



Place the pictures in the empty circles on the preview page.



There is a word map that illustrates what you can learn by looking at a picture.

This is an errorless activity.

My Family Picture

- Ask each student to think of a special memory from their own life. The memory can be a celebration, a family activity, a trip, a favorite meal, time with friends, or an everyday moment that matters to them.
- Students can create their memory picture in whatever way is most accessible to them.
 - Students who are comfortable drawing can draw the people, place, and activity they remember.
 - For students who have difficulty drawing, provide picture symbols, photographs, magazine pictures, or pre-cut images that they can choose from and glue onto the page.
 - Students may also dictate what they would like included while an adult helps create or label the picture.
- After creating the picture, have students complete the questions on the second page to identify who was there, where they were, what they were doing, and how they felt.
- There can be more than one answer to each questions.

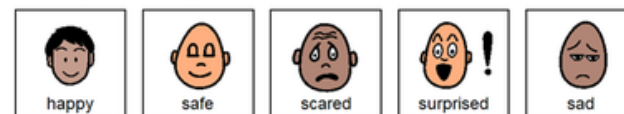

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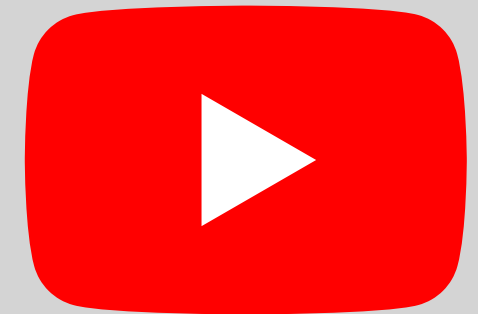
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Students will be given a chance to draw their own family picture and answer some questions about it.
